This year also the museums partnered with University College of London here in Qatar to host another successful exhibition under the name "We are the Daughters of Qatar" in Company House exhibition space.



Innovative Museums

Museums have evolved considerably since being "Cabinets of curiosities" expanding and diversifying genres ranging from weird eclectic museums like spy museums, underwater museums to big traditional historic museums housing millions of objects and artifacts from thousands of years back.

Museums are branching out from the spoon-feeding traditional approach to creating a multi-sensory wholesome experience engaging the visitors' senses and opening their minds to interpret the content in different ways.

Studying birds

Swiss Ornithological Institute in Sempach, Switzerland visitors have the experience of viewing the world from a bird's perspective. "Throughout the visit, visitors must think like a bird, deciding what to eat or where to live. At the end of the tour, visitors learn what kind of bird they resemble most based on their decisions."


Exhibitions and Museums

Doha hosts a number of annual art exhibitions for some talented early career and professional artists, but what distinguishes the summer one which lasts from July to September are some beautiful and inspiring exhibitions, such as:

The Dual Inspirations Exhibition, which takes place in (Garage) Fire Station Art Gallery and brings together a wide variety of works by 18 artists-in-residence, will give these artists the opportunity to translate their works into valuable artistic works that reflect their aesthetic output and the development of their creative sense and techniques. This is also a good opportunity for young artists to collaborate with Mathaf (Arab Museum of Modern Art) in the translation and interpretation of some of the works of art produced in the 1920s into modern and contemporary artworks, which are innovative in thought and serve to recreate those artistic works from an invigorating modern perspective. It is worth mentioning that the Fire Station Art Gallery provides an opportunity for artists and researchers (artists-in-residence) through studios offering an ideal environment for creativity and interaction among different artists, through technical workshops, etc.





The Arab Museum of Modern Art is a leading museum in the State of Qatar. Hosting a number of modern and contemporary collections from the Arab World, the museum is a space for anyone to use and benefit from. It is also a forum for meetings and interactive discussions about art.

On the outskirts of Doha, precisely in the Arab Museum of Modern Art, the exhibition of the Qatari artist Bouthayna Al-Muftah (Echoes) unveils with first-rate innovative works of art in which she records her childhood memories, personal thoughts and human attitudes in the form of edifying works from the gamut of the artist's cultural and social repertoire. The distinctive work of the artist is also reflected in her use of various materials such as glass and cloth.



Msheireb Museums Friends: Becoming Expert Museum Educators

In this issue we will shed a light on teachers' experiences in the museums who are part of the Msheireb Museums Friends program created by the education team. The program has been running for almost 2 years for teachers from different schools, different grades teaching different subjects from both local and International schools. The teachers learn the museums' content to eventually become expert tour guides for their students customizing their own tours to their curriculum.



The teachers join an extensive training program, which spans over several months in the year becoming familiar with the museums' content through tours by the education team supported by a detailed written guideline for each and every section in the museums.

The program concludes with an assessment to test their knowledge and ensure that all teachers are fully equipped to run their own tours and a yearly graduation ceremony held at the World Museums Day celebration.

In the past year, cultural and youth centers also joined the program learning how to lead their own tours for their students and center members. The program is constantly being developed and enhanced to encompass as many interested educators as possible with plans to diversify the MMF with new members from new schools, centers and hopefully university students.

In the next section we will share the MMF experiences with the program and get to know the activities they have created with their students supporting their curriculum.

Qatar in the past, present and future" These are some of the words of His Highness Sheikh Hamad Bin Khalifa Al Thani, the Father Emir, which convey many meanings which could be translated in all areas of life. The echoes of these words are undoubtedly reflected in Msheireb Downtown Doha in general and Msheireb Museums in particular, which embody the the past and its legacy. We experience there the taste of life in the imposing Radwani House and move progressively to embrace freedom in Bin Jelmood House, and then onto the prospects of the "black gold" (oil) in the Company's Head Office or also known as the Company House, which was a turning point in many aspects of Qatar's economic, social and political life. It opened up great horizons and drew the configurations of the future of the country, as can be witnessed in Sheikh Mohammed Bin Jassim's House that I invite you, dear reader, to discover "Msheireb in the Past, Present and Future."

When I first joined "Msheireb Museums Friends" program, I was profoundly convinced that its outcomes could only be clear and tangible because of my personal belief that the four Houses do not represent mere commodities and historical narratives. Rather, they provide free educational material that undoubtedly simulate life and interacts with history in a way that distinguishes these four Houses from the other museums in the State of Qatar students or tourists visit and which, in the main, consist of tours around displays of museum holdings and manuscripts. Msheireb Museums, in contrast, addresses the student's mind and fulfills several educational purposes that I will state below.

One of my dreams as a student of history at Qatar University was to visit the museums of Muhammad Ali Palace (Manial Palace) in Egypt and Hagia Sophia Mosque and Church in Turkey. This persistence, in fact, is not unique to me personally, but one of the strongest reasons that attract tourists, researchers and students to these museums is the principle of originality of everything: the original building itself, the artifacts and collections used in the building, social life and the fact that the kind of life experienced in the original place is relived in these buildings is what really keeps people coming to these museums. It is an edifying experience that helps consolidate knowledge and education which, as a matter of fact, do not merely consist of teaching and using old materials from displayed books and collectibles.

These unique qualities exist in the four Houses located in Msheireb Museums, thus making it the first destination for education, historically speaking, where the visitor does not only get exposed to objects and artificats, but the original location which narrates and simulates the history of the same place. Radwani House, for instance, is a living example of Qatari social life, and is actually the original home of Radwani family, after which the Museum is named.

As you take a tour, you subconsciously relive and reconstruct the social life, and you feel the presence of the souls who once inhabited the building as though you were living with them in the past. This vivid image will be deeply engraved in the mind of the visitor/learner, in a precise, practical and emotional way. As for the rest of the Houses, each has its own unique educational style, through such outlets as smart TV screens and original interviews, using quality writing and media, as well as the relevance of the content and its dissemination among the public in an attractive and lucid style grasped by young and old alike.

In conclusion, I can only confirm, once again, that when you actually visit the four Houses, the idea that "the house is still teeming with life" will mesmerize you.

Msheireb Museums offer a rich environment for applied learning outside school walls, especially for the kindergarten stage, as I intend to use Radwani House as a model in the introduction of ancient and modern Qatar. Their rich holdings and varied materials, which represent the country's old life pattern, helped us discover the materials used in the old construction style and household tools, all located in an inspiring house that exhibits the warmth of the family as a characteristic of the Qatari society in modern and ancient times. This first experience of the place will help us connect the child to the homeland and strengthen his sense of belonging.



Children at the kindergarten level are also able to learn about the different trades associated with the discovery of oil and the means of transportation used at that time, especially 'Antarnash (pidginized form of the word "International" in reference to the then popular US trucks manufacturer), and this exposure enables the child to compare between these trades and those practiced nowadays under our wise leadership, which have made of Qatar one of the most developed countries in the world.

I hope that the implementation of this program will help raise our children's awareness of the efforts of their parents and grandparents, and how these contributed to the fame and reputation of our beloved country among the nations of the world. Community: Services, Past-Present-Future

All Grade 2 students were able to attend a field trip to the Msheireb Museum to explore How We Organise Ourselves: Communities provide services to meet the needs of their members. During our visit we focused on the Radwani House and the Mohammed bin Jassim house to focus on the ways the Msheireb neighborhood has changed over time and how it meets the needs of the community members.

During the day we used the museum spaces to formulate questions about the past, present and future. Students also were able to use and analyse evidence from a variety of historical, geographical and societal sources.

Humanities, Maths, PE and Arts Connections

Humanities

While in the Radwani House students were able to better understand how life changed for Qatar's residents, using real objects as the peacock mirror, clothing items and luxury items to see how rooms were simple and developed over time. In the Mohammed bin Jassim House, students were able to look at artefacts from the past, consider designs of the new buildings in the area and the ways the neighborhood will grow to be sustainable.

Maths and Arts

While visiting Souq Waqif students kept records of the services found in the souq to be used to develop bar graphs and charts. Looking at the way buildings are designed using shapes and forms, as well as, the patterns in the buildings; students then created their own pattern tile using recycled materials to make impressions and shapes in their clay.

PE

Museum staff taught the students traditional Qatari games such as: taq taq taiya, khishaisha, and har barid in the courtyard to get the students moving around. Overall students, teachers and parent were amazed at the wonderful museum which is tucked away in the Msheireb neighborhood that highlights and shares our Qatari culture and traditions.

Msheireb Museums, Offering Windows To The Past For Our Students

I fell in love with the atmosphere and tranquility of the Msheireb Museums the first time I entered the premises. Among hustle and bustle of the Doha city, it felt like a haven of peace and as much a journey to the past as to my inner self.

Naturally, I wanted to share this experience with my students the first possible moment. In the end of the first term last year, we packed two buses full of 3rd-graders and started our excursion to the history of Msheireb area and Qatar in general. The goal was to raise children's appreciation and awareness of the history their home city, learn about history as a subject and have a concrete experience related to Qatar History. Methods needed to be active and hands on, in order to awake their interest and keep it up. Curriculum references included Qatar History, Social studies, English and World History.



We entered the time machine in the form of SEPPO game (available in seppo.io), an interactive mobile game platform where learning contents can totally be produced by teachers themselves. Students join a game, answer questions online and get immediate feedback from teachers. All you need is an Internet connection and some mobile devices. For our young target group, we chose the Radwani house and the Company house as our visiting program.

We started the day in the learning center where we could get all students online with their iPads. After a short introduction to the task their objective was to visit all Radwani house rooms with special task in the SEPPO game.



I had downloaded the map of the house with specific interactive stations where they needed to answer questions related to each room in the house. As the target group was students aged 7-9, we could not let them run free in the museum but all rooms were introduced by a teacher and after a short discussion they could complete the task by themselves.

I was positively surprised by the results we got from the visit. Students were highly engaged to the program and the whole activity. They understood the task from the beginning even though we had not tried the same activity before. The beauty of a SEPPO game is that there are several possibilities to complete the given task in forms of written answers, audio recording, video or photo. This opportunity created a safe learning atmosphere to all students to participate the activity. No matter in which level they were in their language or content skills, the results could be delivered and reviewed and learning happened in all possible levels.



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We walked through the Radwani house and the Company house with semi- structured introductions and self- guided activity phases. Teachers were giving instant feedback by points and comments to the students' answers. Students learned (by answering questions and getting feedback) about the history in Doha and the Msheireb area, core issues in Qatar history and foundation of the society from past times to the present. They were actively involved to their learning process by asking and responding to the questions teachers had set to them and they got instant feedback in a form of an online game that seemed to be very attractive to them.

Also, one of the SEPPO's feature is that you have a wonderful set of material you can use for learning also in future, back in the classroom.

Back at school, we made a gallery walk including the photos and videos students had created in the museum and we deepened the information with writing and exercises. Students found this way of working very rewarding since they had been in an active role of collecting and classifying the materials we used for further studies. I sincerely believe, this is the way for deeper learning in any give subject, and in this case, both our method and the amazing learning setting that the Msheireb Museums have to offer, were leading this activity to its success

This way a museum visit is not just another irrelevant field trip in the course of a school year, but an integrated part of the curriculum and learning targets of a specific content you want your students to learn.

Back to Msheireb: A Positive Example of Innovation in Museum Practices

The cultural sector is now facing a challenging period that has led museums to dedicate more efforts to accomplish their social function. To further engage with the audiences, museums are experimenting with innovative programmes and approaches that are sometimes the results of collaborative projects with communities and other cultural or arts organisations. In Qatar's context, Msheireb Museums are pioneers of this new trend in museum practices.

The Museums and their staff are actively trying to adapt to the constantly changing world, and especially the background of Doha, and to play a more active role in society. To do so, they recently initiated fruitful collaborations with local academic partners that allowed students to refine the institutions' curatorial and interpretative processes, whilst offering something new to the visitors. The exhibition Back to Msheireb: Shared Streets - Shared Stories, hosted at Mohammed Bin Jassim House from the 4th of April to the 5th of October 2017, is a valid example of that.

It was organised by students of UCL Qatar, as part of their yearly UCLQurates initiative of the MA in Museum and Gallery Practice and told the story of how old Msheireb was transformed from a residential Qatari neighbourhood to a vibrant marketplace. Through this project, a diverse class of 20 MA students had the chance to create a real temporary exhibition from scratch, collaborating closely with the museums' staff in a professional environment.

The students worked on all steps necessary for an exhibition development process, including content's curation and interpretation, the design of the space, promotion and evaluation, and also the planning of related educational activities for schools and families; and this was a long and difficult journey. The project was indeed full of challenges to face, such as the short time to deliver the exhibition, the heterogeneity of the class, and the use of two languages (Arabic and English), and many last-minute problems to solve. However, it represented an incomparable opportunity to gain concrete work experience, to acquire new skills and to become familiar with professional museum standards.

Back to Msheireb and every other collaborative project undertook by the Museums, can be considered catalysts for new museum practices, not only in the region, but also globally. These ground-breaking experiments facilitate a knowledge exchange that helps the Museums to rethink their strategies in a fresh way, the students to improve their learning through a concrete experience, and the voice of the local community to be considered and integrated in the museums' point of view.

Indeed, for example in Back to Msheireb, oral histories were collected from the community and presented in the exhibition, where visitors could listen to these voices from the past, experiencing a sense of nostalgia throughout a pop-up stores' installation. A thorough transformation is necessary in the museum sector and Msheireb Museums are striving to be at the forefront of innovation affirming their social role and promoting their relevance in the community.
